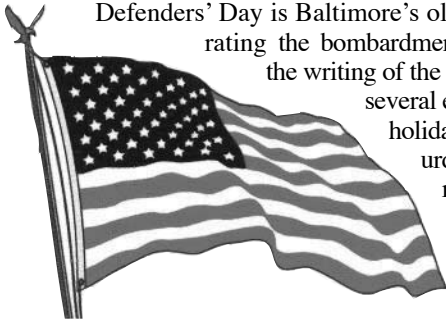

Defenders' Day is Baltimore's oldest holiday commemorating the bombardment of Fort McHenry and the writing of the national anthem. There are several events associated with the holiday. Two events on Saturday September 10th help raise money for the community:

The Star Spangled Spectacular is a VIP reception on the grounds of Fort McHenry, with catered food and drink for Friends' members, sponsors and guests. Participants can observe the Defenders' Day evening program from reserved ringside seats for the re-enactment of the bombardment and the fireworks display. Trash and Recycling:

Trash pick up is every Wednesday. Baltimore City law requires that all residences have durable trash cans with tight fitting lids. Residences are limited to two 32-gallon trash cans each. Trash must be put out in cans.

Recycling pick up is every Friday. There is no need to sort recyclables into separate bins and an unlimited amount of recyclables is allowed.

Acceptable recyclable materials include: •Plastics with any number from 1 to 7 on the bottom (Including wide-mouth plastic containers such as margarine, yogurt, sour cream containers, empty plastic prescription bottles, plastic drinking cups) •Rinsed milk and juice cartons •Empty aerosol cans •Glass jars and bottles •Aluminum, tin and steel food cans and foil •Mixed paper (all colors, mail, books (hardback, paperback and textbooks included), newsprint, folders, magazines, card - board, cereal boxes, phone books)

Unacceptable: •Plastic bags • Dry cleaning bags •Wire hangers •Chemicals or paint •Used paper napkins, towels, plates and tissues •Metallic wrapping paper •Non-bottle or jar glass, window glass •Used food containers and waxed-lined boxes •Foam or plastic packaging material •Motor oil containers, bottles and cans used for toxic substances.

Note about PLASTIC BAGS: Please reuse your plastic bags by donating them to the doggie bag bins in Latrobe Park.

What Can We Do To See That No TRASH BLOWS?

Walking around our great Locust Point the other day, I was remembering some of the stories told by lifelong residents about how they cared for their little bit of L.P. Using bleach on the marble steps, sweeping the side walk each day, and growing sidewalk gardens in pots were traditional maintenance for their homes. It made me think that perhaps we could follow their example and spruce our little bits of the neighborhood.

We're in the process of moving from Towson Street to Hull Street. Inspired by the beautiful garden at Cooksie and Beason, I have decided to create a small street garden in front of our new place: a couple of oversized pots with small trees and flowers for others to enjoy. Did you see the tall sunflowers on Hull St? The gardener said they were an accident, leftover sunflower seeds from last year that fell to the ground and produced beautiful, tall, flowers this year to feed the birds and create community beauty. Many kind residents have been maintaining the large, black, street flowerpots by watering and replacing spent plants with bushes and flowers. This beauty is an outstanding example of what can be done to create a "green and clean" community while reducing the debris and weeds that plague us all!

The Baltimore City Department of Public Works is responsible for collecting your trash and recycling, removing graffiti, and removing and storing eviction items, among other things. But we have responsibilities too. Among those listed on DPW's website:

Your Responsibilities:

- Keep your property clear of trash and well-maintained.
- Clean your sidewalk and alley and along your curbs.
- Remove weeds.
- Use durable trash cans with tight-fitting lids.
- Trim the trees and shrubs on your property and cut your grass.
- Weed and care for trees in the sidewalk; clean trash from the tree boxes.
- Maintain our drains, "gutters" and the City's sewer lines.
- Participate in neighborhood cleanups.
- Report illegal dumping, abandoned vehicles and other criminal activities.
- Do not put your water lines from the meter to your house as well as sewer lines on your property.
- Do not use your sink or toilet to dispose of grease, rags, paper towels or other foreign objects. These will clog your drain.
- Do not hesitate to call 311 if you need assistance or have a question

So, as we move into the fall and toward and Locust Point Festival on September 10th, lets make Locust Point a clean and green showcase community. Take a few minutes each day to look at your little bit of the community, pull a couple of weeds, and don't let the trash blow.



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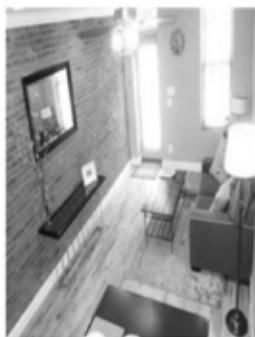
